It also shaped our engagement with the accelerating role of artificial intelligence, both in trial design and in the administration of research, where innovation must be balanced with transparency, accountability, and trust. Throughout, we remained deeply attentive to the evolving regulatory and legal landscape, ensuring that ethical ambition and practical feasibility advance in tandem.
